## According to the most recent data

Approximately 92 million adults in America use prescription opioids and it is estimated that 11.5 million of them misused the drug and another 1.9 million Americans were identified as having an opioid use disorder.

Continuing medical education (CME) is an important tool that can be utilized to better identify and treat addiction, reduce opioid abuse, diversion and opioid related deaths. CME can improve doctors' clinical performance that ultimately impacts the quality of individual and community health outcomes.
